The Davis Gallery Committee will review proposals and contact applicants in April or May, 2025. Finalists will be asked to schedule an informal interview with the Davis Gallery staff. This will allow us to get a better sense of the exhibition and offer a forum for all parties to ask questions. Please note that being asked back for an interview does not guarantee a slot in the exhibition calendar.

Davis Gallery staff will relay recommendations to the Committee, and the Committee will contact applicants with the final decisions and exhibition calendar in May or June.

Guiding Principles and Tips for a Competitive Application

The Davis Gallery is a student-powered initiative for creative projects. The Gallery is oriented towards professional development for curators and Gallery staff. We value collaborative, thoughtful, innovative projects. We welcome a wide range of exhibitions, from more traditional thematic displays using the University Art Collection, to community collaborations, to experimental exhibitions or installations. By providing a safe space to share artwork and ideas, the Gallery hopes to facilitate exciting conversations and opportunities for the DU campus community and beyond.


As the Committee evaluates applications, we focus on three areas:

- 1) <u>Logistics</u> how feasible is this exhibition? Does it fit the abilities and financial resources of the Davis Gallery? The more detail applicants supply about how they will logistically produce their exhibition the better.
- 2) Quality this is highly subjective. We take into consideration the quality of artworks, curatorial idea, exhibition organization, and the application itself. We recognize that applicants have different amounts of experience with exhibition proposals; accordingly, relative experience is taken into account. We value and want to work with first-time and emerging curators.
- 3) <u>Davis Gallery Values</u> how well does the exhibition align with the Davis Gallery values?
 - a) Student driven (i.e., student work and/or student organized)
 - b) Community collaboration (i.e., addresses social issues and/or engages cross-departmental partnerships)
 - c) Relevant to the greater DU community on and off campus (student, faculty, staff, alumni)

To help you prepare, particularly regarding exhibition organization and practical development, here is a list of tasks/procedures that the Davis Gallery staff will do for every exhibition. This is not an exhaustive list, but a general set of practices. Staff will meet with all exhibition organizer(s) to evaluate their individual needs.

- Prep gallery (patching holes and painting)
- Print vinyl wall texts
- Update website
- Some marketing and outreach
- Design and print gallery guides/labels
- Assist with poster design, if needed
- Assist with installation
- Provide hanging hardware, select pedestals
- Consult on and approve exhibition layout
- Organize an opening reception, purchase food


Call For DU Student & Alumni Art!

"Outdated" references both the medium of using up-cycling outdated old garments and objects, as well as the concept of retooling outdated gender constructs which have been perpetuated throughout the history of fashion. This exhibition explores the history of fashion within the realm of how specific sihlouettes, patterns, materials, objects, and fabrics have been used as signifiers for the history of evolving gender norms.

The goal is to create nonbinary garments/wearable art objects, which celebrate the shape of the body and person as

an individual.



- Must utilize recycled/up-cycled materials.
- Must implement a retooling of gender dynamics referential to fashion history.
- Must be a wearable art object to be displayed on the body.
- Must provide model for show. (Can use yourself)
